Cabarets are coming back!

Because of the pandemic, it's been two years since our last offering in the Grace Lieberman Cabaret Series. It's time to start again. Scheduling performers has not been as easy as I had imagined. It seems that the forced time off has caused many to rethink their priorities. Nevertheless, the offerings as of this date include: **Golden Bough**, an internationally known local Celtic music group, is scheduled for May 28th. **Synergy**, the chamber music group who were the last to perform in the gallery in 2020 will be presenting "Music of the America's II" on July 30th. **Karolina Syrovatkova**, a dramatic concert pianist who opened our cabaret series in 2019 with her production of "Clara," will bring her new creation, "Lady in a Bow Tie," to our center on November 12th. Mark your calendars. Additional information will be coming as the dates approach.

Grant Applications: We have just finished the application for a continuation of our SLP (State Local Partnership) grant through the California Arts Council. If successful, it will bring in \$65,000 to support our efforts toward developing an arts council for Stanislaus County. (We are currently operating in the second year of an initial \$90,000 award.) During the pandemic shutdown, we were also able to achieve a \$25,000 grant for COVID relief through the County and receive a continuation of the Art in Schools grant for \$18,000. Because of these funds, we




have come through the pandemic relatively intact.

Artist Open Studio tour 10th Anniversary

Stanislaus Artist Open Studio Tour returns for its 10th anniversary on **Saturday, April 23 and Sunday, April 24, from 11:00 a.m. to 5:00 p.m.** A free booklet, available online and in print, contains photos of the art and descriptions of the 41 artists on the tour. Tour participants can plan their car rides to visit artisans and makers of jewelry, ceramics, paintings, wood working, mosaic, textiles and photography metal working. Artists may show visitors the tools and materials while demonstrating some of their skills. Visitors can purchase directly from the artists while supporting the local art community. On the tour, visitors can enter a free drawing to win one of four art pieces, created by artists Rhett Owings, Barbara Gill, Randy Crimmel, and Richard Bradshaw.

Artists will display directional signs to their studios or outdoor spaces. The tour booklet will be available at Mistlin Gallery, 1015 J Street, Modesto, Tuesday through Friday, 11:30 am to 5:00 p.m. and Saturday 12:00 to 4:00 p.m. Carnegie Arts Center, 250 Broadway, Turlock, Tuesday through Saturday 10:00 a.m. to 5:00 p.m. and online at www.stanislausaos.com.

The first Artist Open Studio tour was organized in 2010 by Alice Richards, who provided the start-up money and organized the artists. Ms. Richards worked with the Travel and Tourism Board and the Stanislaus County Regional Roundtable to support the artists. The Roundtable was a group of business leaders and service organizations from the nine Stanislaus cities. The goal of the Artist Open Studio Tour was to promote county talent and to build an audience and patrons for the visual arts. The Roundtable hosted an event at the Modesto Convention Center, where the public learned about Artist Open Studio. Mistlin Gallery



hosted the artists' potlucks and distributed materials for the artists. The Gallo Center for the Arts hosted preview shows for Open Studio Artists in the lobby. The Modesto Bee publicized the event on the cover of Scene Magazine. Local business supported the tour by purchasing advertisements in the tour book. The first tour map was \$10 and included thirty artists and "passport" with entry form to win a piece of art. The tour repaid Ms. Richards and became self-sufficient. However, COVID canceled the 2020 tour, and all the booklets were discarded. Following COVID guidelines, the tour resumed on October 2021 and became free to the public. This year's event includes eleven artists who participated in the original 2011 tour.

Dan Peterson Memorial Exhibit

Coming to the Mistlin gallery June 7 - July 9.

Arts County Arts Council News

It's the Water

I could, of course, be delusional, but it seems to me that Modesto may be at the center of a vortex of creative, artistic energy. I've never been a big believer in the humanistic interpretation of vortices, such as those purported to exist at places such as Sedona, Arizona, wherein the spiral movement of energy in and out of our earthly plane is supposed to aid people in their spiritual development. But when I took on the task of reviving the Arts Council for Stanislaus County and began making a list of the artists and art groups in the area, and picking up bits of their history, I was amazed at the abundance (or should I say overabundance?) of talented people from here who have achieved prominence in their fields over the vears. Bevond that, there also seemed to be clusters of these overachievers appearing at specific points in time that belied the fact that they all came from a small rural town in the Central Valley of California.

When I mentioned this observation to my friend, Roy Stevens, the general director of Opera Modesto (a Modesto native who had gone on to an international career in opera and recently returned to his home town to take of the helm of the company created by another Modesto native, Eric "Buck" Townsend), he didn't blink or question my thoughts, but instead rattled off a list of people he had shared the stage with in the early days of Modesto Youth Theater (now Modesto Performing Arts), under the

direction of Paul Tischer, all of whom had gone on to achieve a level of prominence in their field.

Some of the names were familiar to me, such as Robert Ulrich who was the casting director behind the hit show Glee, for which he won an Emmy Award, and Melanee Wvatt who had gone to New York to pursue a performance career becoming a well known "plus-size" cover girl before returning to Modesto where she started YES company, a youth oriented musical theater group that has spawned numerous other stars in the field. Other names were less familiar, but once Googled, their prominence became clear. There was Kim Johnson Ulrich. Robert's wife who accompanied him to New York and Hollywood where she became a model and a T.V. actress, appearing for a number of years on "As the World Turns." Terry James, a handsome young man with a terrific voice went to Chicago as an actor and became the executive director of the Marriott Theater, one of the most prestigious theaters in the Chicago area. Holly Butler, an actress, singer/songwriter became famous for developing an aerobics program (20 Minute Workout) and appearing as a Marilyn Monroe look-a-like – recently writing a book about the experience, "Me Myself Marilyn." Greg Dean became a clown and later created Greg Dean's Stand Up Comedy Classes and has now trained generations of successful comedians. Douglas Nasrawi became an international opera star. Vernon Willet began as an actor/singer and went on to become a stage manager for major theaters throughout the country. Roger Freitas got a Ph.D. in music history and teaches at the prestigious Eastman School of Music, becoming an international level researcher and award winning author. Brian Beltran continued as

a professional actor and dancer, appearing in several movies. Mark Siciliani became a professional actor in T.V. and movies. The group also consisted of singer/actors, such as Joe Rykert, Dawn Peterson, and Karen Lotko who remained in the community as top performing artists and teachers, touching many lives and beginning new career threads leading out from Modesto.

And if we expand the list beyond this "Golden Age" of musical theater, the numbers continue to grow beyond expectation. Lindsay Pearce appeared on the hit show, Glee, and is now staring as Elphaba in Wicked on Broadway. Morgan James is a singer, songwriter, and actress who has been in numerous Broadway shows and is a star on Post-Modern Juke Box. Jeremy Stolle performs on Broadway in the cast of Phantom of the Opera and tours with his own concert series. Then there is Jeremy Renner of Hollywood and "Hurt Locker" fame, and Timothy Olyphant contineud next page

of T.V. "Justified" fame. And we could add a few young, rising stars such as Samuel Gerber performing with the touring company of "Mean Girls" and Matthew Pena, an opera singer in Germany who I sang with when he was a teenager in a few Townsend Opera productions. And, speaking of opera singers who have their roots in our area, Nathan Stark and Sandra Bengochea have become well known beyond our city limits. Going in the other (older) direction we'd have to include, the aforementioned, Eric "Buck" Townsend (Opera), the old timer, Harve Presnel (actor, singer, movie star). And of course, the "King of the Mountain," George Lucas.

As I stated at the beginning of this article, the sheer number of successful

artists coming from our, then, small community, seemed to be beyond what might be expected. I realize that artistic talent is probably distributed randomly throughout the universe, but this is Modesto, a sleepy, agriculturally based, Valley town. Why here? Many, but not all the people I've listed, point to their experiences with Paul Tischer and the Modesto Youth Theater as the formative focus for their later careers. But not all of the performers went that route. Then too, this is just a list of performing artists. I've begun to look at other artistic genres and am discovering similar groupings in areas such as dance and the visual arts, such as Kirk Rademaker, the internationally renowned sand artist, and Yvonne Porcella, a globally known fiber artist. The biggest surprise, however, has been in the realm of



poetry. The first time I attended the "Ill List," a slam poetry contest at the State Theater, the brain child of Sam Pierstorff, I was astounded at the soldout crowd that was cheering wildly for the performers. Poetry? Sold out? Seriously?

Since then, I've come to accept, without question, that we're in a special place, blessed with an abundance of artistic vibrations of unknown origin. My speculation that there may be some kind of energy vortex at play may be a bit fanciful and esoteric. The explanation could be as simple as that suggested by Robert Ulrich in one of my first talks with him. When others have asked him about the list, he says, "It's the Water." It is on our arch, you know.

Art Quilts 2 now open through April 30



The vision was to create an organization to:

- Promote art quilts to major art publications, museums, and galleries
- · Educate the public about art quilts
- Serve as a forum for the professional development of quilt artists
- Act as a resource for curators, dealers, consultants, teachers, students, and collectors

Over the past 30 years, SAQA has grown to over 3,700 members around the globe. The quilts in this show were made by members in California and Nevada. Most of the quilts are for sale. Our local *Country Crossroads Quilters* have contributed a supply of "tiny" quilts which are also for sale during the show.
